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AROUND THE CAPITOL

Governor Reynolds said she will sign <u>SF 514</u> **STATE GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION** at 3 PM on Tuesday.

The House debated three bills on the floor today on largely unanimous votes, sending two down to the Governor and one over the to the Senate. The House approved <u>SF 135</u> **INTERIOR DESIGN** which makes changes to the practice of interior design. A similar bill passed in the House in 2022, but did not move forward in the Senate. Representative Steckman said that the bill is the result of a compromise between architects and interior designers. The House also introduced one new successor bill and the first of the budget bills, the federal block grant bill which deals with federal pass-through funds (<u>HSB 243</u> **FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS**).

The Senate Appropriations Committee approved four of the budget shell bills in subcommittee and committee today on party-line votes (<u>SSB 1209</u> ADMINISTRATION & REGULATION, <u>SSB 1210</u> AGRICULTURE & NATURAL **RESOURCES**, <u>SSB 1211</u> ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT and <u>SSB 1212</u> EDUCATION). The Committee will take up the three remaining budget bills on Tuesday. Committee members said that they hope that starting the budget process will encourage the House to start moving forward with its budget. Democrats said that the failure to hold subcommittee meetings where legislators could get meaningful feedback from the public hurts the budgeting process. They said that the public and departments should know if positions are going to be eliminated to achieve the savings expected in pending reorganization.

House Appropriations will hold a public hearing on Tuesday on <u>SF 494</u> **PUBLIC ASSISTANCE OVERSIGHT**, which has been approved on the Senate floor and in House Appropriations. Representative Fry is the floor manager. The bill establishes new asset verification requirements for Medicaid, SNAP and CHIP. In comments submitted ahead of the hearing, opponents of the bill said that the state will get no overall savings from the bill and the loss of benefits will hurt working-class lowans and rural areas. Supporters of the bill said that it will reduce fraud and encourage people to work full-time.

The LSA estimates that about 1% of current recipients, (8,000 Medicaid members, 2,800 SNAP recipients and 600 children receiving health insurance) will lose their coverage or benefits under the bill. The DWD expects an annual cost increase of about \$70,000. In FY 2025 and FY 2026, HHS expects staff and technology costs will increase by about \$7.5 million total. The HHS costs decline slightly in FY 2027 and F 2028, but costs for a 3rd-party contract administrator are expected to be about \$1.68 million in the first year and \$3.34 million in the second year. When fully implemented in FY 2028, the LSA estimates that the bill will reduce Medicaid, SNAP and CHIP benefits by about \$65 million, with \$11 million of that being the share paid by the state.

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DISASTER PROCLAMATIONS

Governor Reynolds issued two disaster proclamations this weekend due to the damage caused by storms in lowa on Friday. The first proclamation allows residents in Cedar, Clinton, Delaware, Des Moines, Dubuque, Grundy, Johnson, Keokuk, Linn, Mahaska, Wapello and Washington counties to use the Iowa Individual Assistance Grant Program, which provides grants of up to \$5,000 for qualifying households, and the Disaster Case Management Program, which helps with the creation of disaster recovery plans and referrals to obtain services. The second proclamation suspends various rules on the movement of loads for disaster repairs and the hours of service for crews for the month of April.

FISCAL IMPACTS

SF 551 WITHHOLDING EXEMPTION

Decouples lowa from federal bonus depreciation, allowing depreciation claims in the initial year. The Senate Ways & Means Committee approved the bill and Senator Koelker is the floor manager. The bill does not have a House companion. The estimated impact on the GF varies from year-to-year from FY 2024 to FY 2029, but is estimated at about \$250 million total, with annual reductions in individual income tax at about \$15 million a year, corporate income tax at about \$25 million a year and franchise taxes at about \$3 million a year. The impact in later years would decline because the accelerated depreciation taken from FY 2024-2029 would no longer be available as a business expense in later years.

SF 478 AUDITOR PROCESS INFORMATION

Requires the Auditor to work using federal standards for government audits and audits start. Requires the Auditor keep confidential information confidential and limits the access of the Auditor to some information (income tax, health records, peace officer records, various other records for law enforcement and attorneys, personal information and other specified records). Requires the auditor to take steps to protect information. Requires binding arbitration before a 3-person board for disputes between statutory and constitutional offices, with each party appointing a member and the third member being appointed by the governor.

The full Senate approved <u>SF 478</u>; the House State Government Committee approved the bill with an amendment. Representative Kaufman is the floor manager. The LSA issued a fiscal note for the bill as passed by the Senate. According to the LSA, the bill could affect audit practices for IPERS and for a number of programs, including student aid, unemployment, children's healthcare, WIC and for various federal block grants. The changes could result in those programs receiving a modified opinion during audits and prevent the programs from receiving a low-risk determination. The impact of receiving low-risk determinations is unknown, but would require more frequent audits and could lead to the federal awarding agency taking other actions.

SF 135 INTERIOR DESIGN

Changes interior design to registered interior design and specifies certain covered practices. Makes conforming changes. Exempts work in non-commercial settings and work done under the supervision of a registered practitioner from registration provisions. Requires that registered interior designers have a seal and allows the use of the seal on submissions which include interior design practices that the designer is competent to perform. Prohibits the use of the seal for technical submissions not prepared by the designer. Requires a registered interior designer to avoid conflicts and includes procedures if a conflict cannot be avoided. Allows designers to make technical submissions for projects and deems those submissions to be public records. Requires local governments to accept sealed submissions.

The Senate PASSED the bill 49-0 (2/8)

The House PASSED the bill 95-0; it now GOES to the Governor

SF 197 LAND SURVEYOR LICENSING

Retains requirements for land surveyors to have practical experience for licensing but strikes the 6-year requirement. Strikes outdated licensing provisions and updates references. Strikes the requirements for a candidate to demonstrate necessary practical experience before a licensing exam.

The Senate PASSED the bill 48-0 (3/15)

The House PASSED the bill 94-1; it now GOES to the Governor

HF 359 CHINA BRIDGE ORDERS

Allows a juvenile court to transfer a ChINA case to a district court through the modification of a current bridge order. Includes timelines and other requirements for modifying the order, or other necessary changes to the order, the waiving of filing fees and other matters. Requires the district court to take judicial notice of the juvenile file. Does not require the appointment of counsel in the district court.

SSB 1210 AGRICULTURE & NATURAL RESOURCES APPROPRIATIONS

Makes the FY 2024 GF appropriations for the DALS, DNR, UI and ISU and appropriations from other funds. Makes appropriations for REAP. **PASSED** 13-7; *FM: Zumbach*

SSB 1211 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS

Makes the FY 2024 appropriations for the EDA, the IFA, PERB, DWD, ISU, UI and UNI. Makes appropriations from other funds, includes limits on standing appropriations and includes reporting requirements. **PASSED** 13-7; *FM: Lofgren*

SSB 1212 EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS

Makes the FY 2024 appropriations for the DOE, the DOB and the Regents. Includes limits on standing appropriations. **PASSED** 13-7; *FM: J Taylor*

HOUSE FILES (HF 688)

HF 688 ARRC MATTERS (ARRC; Successor to HSB 81) FM: Sexton

Allows the administrative code editor to make various edits to the Code to correct references and internet links. Deems that the ombudsman is not covered in the exclusion from the executive branch for the legislative branch. Changes the rules for suspending action on noticed rules. Changes how standards can be adopted by reference. Makes the Administrative Rules Coordinator an *ex officio* member of the ARRC. Makes other changes to administrative rules.

HOUSE STUDY BILLS (HSB 243)

HSB 243 FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS (Appropriations) Collins (C), Bagniewski, Stone

Makes the federal black grant appropriations for FY 2024 and FY 2025. Makes appropriations of federal from previous federal years.
